I am teaching a course entitled "Early Intervention for Young Children with Special Needs" and use two texts: Building Blocks for Teaching Preschoolers with Special Needs (Brookes Pub/ Sandall & Schwartz authors) AND Blended Practices for Teaching YOung Children in Inclusive Settings (Grisham-Brown et al./ Brookes Pub.). I was pleased to see the congruence between these texts and Module 1. In fact, the Building Blocks text is cited on a number of occasions in the module activities etc.

I like both books but my students find the Blended Practices text less "readable" so I'm always keeping an eye out for other options.

Textbook Suggestions

I'm going to go out on a limb here and confess that for the last two courses I have taught on-line, I have ended up ditching traditional texts. There are so many on-line resources (CONNECT is a prime example) that deliver good content, and I have found that using a text tends to restrict my creativity and what seems to me like the most logical sequence of content, and students have complained about "too much work" if I have them reading text, and doing web explorations, and watching videos, and

doing field related experiences. I like to keep the course interactive, one of the reasons I really like these CONNECT materials, but I have to be reasonable in my time expectations for students.

This term, for my ECEE 248 class - Children with Disabilities and Their Families, I'm using The Inclusive Early Childhood Classroom, by Gould and Sullivan, but it's really more of a reference/resource of ideas for adapting and modifying. I also have students read The Elephant in the Playroom, by Denise Brody. It's a collection of essays written by parents of kids with disabilities -some pretty powerful stuff.
